Course Description:

- English II is designed to introduce students to major works and authors in World Literature. Through close examination, discussion, and writing, students will analyze the varied themes and structures of World Literature.
- English II is further designed to ensure students master conventions of standard American English in writing.
- Students will take the SAT or ACT in their junior year; this course will therefore emphasize grammar, writing styles and techniques, and the writing process in preparation for the writing sections of those exams. We will consider complex sentence structure, organizational patterns used in essays, and a refinement of vocabulary skills.
- English II students will read five major literary works, use a new textbook series specifically tailored to high academic standards, and engage in daily grammar or writing exercises.
- These skills will be used to prepare students for the North Carolina English II End-of-Course Exam.

Expectations:

A. Attendance Policy

- Students must attend school everyday in order to succeed.
- Students who miss class must check class calendar. They are responsible for making an appointment with me to discuss missing lessons.
- Assignments must be made up within 5 school days of returning from absence (CMS policy)

- Typed assignments must follow the established guidelines. USE 12 point font size, Times New Roman font, and it must be double spaced. Please indent new paragraphs. There should not be extra space between paragraphs; indenting signals a new idea.
- Homework at the start of class. If an assignment is submitted at the end of class or at the end of the day, the assignment is late.
- When working with a partner, you must put the answers in your own words if you are submitting separate assignments. (Hough High School Honor Code)

Assessment and Grading:

Grading is done on a weighted system:

Formal Assessments are worth 70% of the total grade (60% during Qtr 1 and Qtr 3) Informal Assignments are worth 30% of the total grade (20% during Qtr 1 and Qtr 3) Midterm (20%)

Retesting Policy:

Students who score lower than a 79% on an assessment may retake the test for a maximum score of 79%. Before a retest will be granted, the student must perform some type of remediation. If a student takes the retest, then the score on the retest will be entered into the gradebook as a final score. Students have 10 days after the grade is posted to take a retest.

Late Work Policy:

Informal assignments submitted late without an excused absence will be given a maximum grade of 50 percent.

Formal assignments submitted late without a pass will be deducted ten points each day that the assignment is late.

Supplies Needed:

Students are expected to have the following supplies by the 3rd day of class:

- Pencils and pens
- A 3 ring binder (at least 1 ½ inches))
- Loose leaf paper (enough to last for the entire semester)
